Officer Nominees

You may notice on page 7 that the list of nominees for office is a short one. That is because of a bylaw change passed at the 2012 convention to stagger the terms of office for elected positions. Officers are now elected for a four-year term, with just half of the officers elected at each convention. This means at any given convention half remain in office and half are new. We no longer have to fill the entire slate every two years, nor do we start with an entirely new set of officers every four years. This year we elect the president, two vice presidents, the recording secretary, the financial secretary and the zone liaison.

A Word From the President

On Saturday, February 1, 75 women from across the northern portion of the Southeastern District of the LCMS met for a day of Connections at the Lutheran Church of St. Andrew in Silver Spring, MD. Co-sponsored by the SED and LINC-Baltimore, the event featured speakers including Connie Denninger, "first lady" of the SED, Tina Jasion, Di-

rector of LINC-Baltimore, and Jennifer Einold of Bold Whisper Marketing, a social media strategist. There was also an opportunity to mingle and network with representatives of a broad range of outreach and service ministries for women, including visual arts, education, blogging and online Bible study, book studies and retreats, and of course, the LWML!! Tina Jasion, a former mem-

ber of the Board of Directors for our LWML Chesapeake District, spoke passionately about how her time with the LWML and the encouragement of her mother-in-law, faithful LWML member Betty Jasion, formed her pathway to pursuing a Masters of Christian Outreach degree from Concordia--St. Paul, her work as a church outreach director and Mission Development speaker and teacher, and her current position with LINC-Baltimore. She referenced the LWML mission statement as a clear example of what we as Lutheran women are here to do. She shared specific ideas about how each of us has a role to play in "building up the Kingdom of God" in our communities. Mission Grants 2012-2014

Mission Outreach and Grants

Since November, Concordia Lutheran's food pantry has received funds for a new refrigerator (mission grant #7). May they continue to feed their recipients with the nourishment of food and the Word of Our Lord.

Grants eight and nine should be funded by the time this update is published. Zion Praise Tabernacle Lutheran Church in Bowie, Maryland is receiving funds to expand its outreach ministry. LCMS-World Mission will be receiving funds for theological training for Vietnam.


As the end of our biennium looms on June 31, 2014, five mission grants remain unfunded. Those funds total over \$20,000. Lutheran Bible Translators in Botswana, Africa await funds to further their translation of God's Word for the Kalanga people. Messiah Lutheran Church in Germantown, Maryland is reaching out to their Chinese population. Concordia Lutheran Mission in Lexington, Virginia awaits funds to equip a new twenty four/seven space for their use. Concordia Lutheran Church in Hagerstown, Maryland is adding a kindergarten to its preschool. Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Hampton, Virginia is working to expand its Child Development Center.

Do you have mites in your mite box? Are you adding to your mite box regularly? Have you added mites to your society's mite box recently? I urge you to encourage one another to participate in collecting mites, not only members you know but also those you do not. I was recently reminded that ladies belonging to my church, Redeemer Lutheran in Richmond, Virginia, are not always aware that, as confirmed members of our congregation, they are automatically LWML members. Some have been members for years. Are all your ladies aware that they are members of LWML? Encourage participation in all LWML activities.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

I want to celebrate teamwork. I read that the "T" in team stands for together, the "E" stands for everyone, the "A" stands for accomplishes, and the "M" stands for more. What a wonderful statement that teamwork needs to include both I and you to reach our objectives. Jesus said in John 15, "I no

longer call you servants, because a servant does not know his master's business. Instead, I have called you friends, for everything that I learned from my Father I have made known to you." Jesus wanted the disciples to work with Him instead of simply for Him. The LWML accomplishes more when we work together at the congregational level, the district level, and the worldwide level.

Christians learned teamwork from God. When God created the heavens and earth and all living creatures, God explained in Genesis 1:26, "Let us make man in our image, in our likeness, and let them rule over the fish of the sea and the birds of the air, over the livestock, over all the earth, and over all the creatures that move along the ground." God the Trinity was working together as a team, and gave man and woman work to accomplish in concert with God's care of this world. Jesus further explained the teamwork between the three persons in One God, as He described in John 5, "Jesus said to them, 'My Father is always at His work to this very day, and I, too, am working.'

Jesus then includes the work of the Holy Spirit and the work of believers as a team to accomplish the purposes of God. Jesus explained according to John 16, "I have much more to say to you, more than you can now bear. But when He, the Spirit of Truth, comes, He will guide you into all truth. He will not speak on His own; He will speak only what He hears, and He will tell you what is yet to come. He will bring glory to Me by taking from what is Mine and making it known to you. All that belongs to the Father is Mine. That is why I said the Spirit will take from what is Mine and make it known to you."

What an incredible promise Jesus makes to believers! God wants us to know His business and He wants us to be involved. We should feel honored to be called to participate in God's business in this world. Jesus said,

"This is to My Father's glory, that you bear much fruit, showing yourselves to be my disciples."

I miss some of the entertainers from years ago that understood the value of teamwork, honor, and sacrifice, such as Red Skelton, Jimmy Durante, and Jimmy Stewart. I think of how we should glorify and honor God with our time and talents as we serve Him in the Kingdom business. There's a wonderful story about Jimmy Durante, one of the great entertainers of a generation ago. I read this from Tim Hansel, Holy Sweat, 1987. Word Books Publisher, p. 104-105. Jimmy was asked to be a part of a show for World War II veterans. He told them his schedule was very busy and he could afford only a few minutes, but if they wouldn't mind his doing one short monologue and immediately leaving for his next appointment, he would come. Of course, the show's director agreed happily. But when Jimmy got on stage, something interesting happened. He went through the short monologue and then stayed. The applause grew louder and louder and he kept staying. Pretty soon, he had been on fifteen, twenty, then thirty minutes. Finally he took a last bow and left the stage. Backstage someone stopped him and said, "I thought you had to go after a few minutes. What happened?" Jimmy answered, "I did have to go, but I can show you the reason I stayed. You can see for yourself if you'll look down on the front row." In the front row were two men, each of whom had lost an arm in the war. One had lost his right arm and the other had lost his left. Together, they were able to clap, and that's exactly what they were doing, loudly and cheerfully.

Teamwork influences those around them. Teamwork touches the hearts and minds of those who are involved as well as those who are observing. I also enjoy learning from this wonderful creation God gave us to care for. Bees can show us something about teamwork. On a warm day, about half the bees in a hive stay inside beating their wings, while the other half go out to gather pollen and nectar. Because of the beating wings, the temperature inside the hive is about 10 degrees cooler than outside. The bees rotate duties, and the bees that cool the hive one day are gatherers the next

Dear friends in Christ, let us bee about the work of God in this world as we share the responsibilities, take turns, encouraging one another, and let none of the sinful nature selfish habits get in the way of our Godhonoring teamwork.






