### from our DISTRICT PRESIDENT

What is considered an Active Society/Group and an Inactive Society/Group? This question has been asked numerous of times. So, my article for the Chesapeake Breeze will hopefully answer the question. Based to the LWML guidelines and as the District President what I have to report to national LWML are the following:

**Active Society/Group** must meets all or most of the following guidelines:

- Has officers or a networker/contact person
- Meets at least quarterly
- Participates in, or is aware and supportive of zone and/or district events
- Contributes to mites and prays for the missions mites support
- Subscribes to the Quarterly.

**Active Member of a Society/Group** must participate on a regular basis in her group activities she would be referred to as an active member. Active society/group members are eligible to represent their district at a national LWML convention which their zone and district bylaws.

Active Individual Member must meet all or most of the following guidelines:

- Participates in and is supportive of zone and/or district events
- Contributes to mites and prays for the missions mites support
- Subscribes to the Quarterly

Active individual members may be eligible for voting privileges at the zone level (refer to local zone bylaws), but **are not** eligible for voting privileges at the district level (LWML Chesapeake District Bylaws, Article III, Section 1e), and **are not** eligible for voting privileges as an individual member at the national level (LWML National Bylaws, Article II, Section 1e). If an individual member is elected by the zone to represent them at a national convention they may do so as they are classified as a zone representative.

The following describes a **Supporting Society/Group**: Does not have officers or a networker/contact person; Does not meet or contribute to Mites consistently, but continues to pray regularly for LWML This is what we refer to as "**Inactive**" for the purpose of reporting the number of societies/groups to national LWML, we refer to these groups as supporting.

A **Supporting Member of a Society/Group** is all communicant women in their congregation members of their society/group. The women in this category do not actively attend any LWML functions. The LWML District President should report them as supporting members of national LWML. Supporting society/groups are not eligible to represent their district at a national or district LWML convention, as their knowledge of LWML activities would be limited.

### Arise, shine, for your light has come



### "Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you" Isaiah 60:1

Beloved Zig Ziglar is internationally known for his faith and motivational quotes. One of the his most difficult motivational quotes to follow for a person steeped in any type of loss or fear is:

### Get Up! Get Dressed! Show Up!

Many times, it takes effort just to get up, let alone get dressed, and then to show up?? When we connect with God, our Heavenly Father, through prayer, and reading His Word, we can, at His pace, **begin** to get up, get dressed and show up. It takes time; it doesn't necessarily happen overnight.

It takes all of us, together to "Make known his deeds among the peoples, proclaim that his name is exalted...for great in our midst is the Holy One of Israel."



Returning God's Blessings

How much is too much control? The LWML Gifts of Love Ministry encourages God's people to respond to the presence of God's gifts in one's estate by putting together a gift plan that looks to bless the family we love and the ministries that are close to our hearts. Without planning, such desires are only wishes and may not happen, unless

they are spelled out in wills/trusts or detailed in beneficiary designations for investments, IRA's, insurance contracts or even one's house.

The two most important questions you want to answer are:

- 1) How do I want this gift (inheritance) to bless family members? Starting from that goal, you can construct a plan of blessing.
- 2) How do I want this gift (bequest) to bless the ministry or ministries I care about? You might think of placing restrictions on how those gifts will be used.

There is a fine line between Godly planning and trying to become God ourselves. We don't want family to waste God's gifts. We want to make sure that future needs of family are addressed. We want to make sure that gifts to ministry will do more than purchase new bushes for the parking lot. But how do I know when I am getting too restrictive about the gifts I am planning, either withholding family gifts well into the future that could really jumpstart an education or career today or planning gifts for ministry that reflect values that are not widely held by others in that ministry, potentially orphaning my gifts with too many restrictions?

There is no easy answer to these questions. The process begins and ends with prayer, with prayer throughout, as we seek God's will. In a perfect world, a family inheritance will include discussion with children, grandchildren or other heirs. Planned ministry gifts will include discussion with ministry leaders to gain a clear vision for future ministry plans. Connecting gifts with those plans will maximize their effectiveness.

Your LWML Gift Planning Counselor can be helpful with all of this, asking you the right questions in your quest to put together the right plan for family and ministry. Most of all, we desire this process to recognize throughout that all of these gifts are the Lord's gifts. ### **Grant Update from Faith and Work Enterprises**



Dear Martha and the Chesapeake District LWML Board of Directors,

We are so thankful for your support through the 2018 mission grant that has contributed to our relationship-building, care, advocacy and gospel outreach in the Sandtown-Winchester community. Securing a suitable location within the 21217 zip code to hold the workforce development program and production operations for Pennsylvania Avenue Chocolates has proved to be a great challenge. Meetingthe obstacles head on, we focused on the work we have been doing all along – providing referral and crisis care to residents who live in the neighborhood.

Our Director of Programs is present in the neighborhood six days per week conducting outreach and connecting people to services, offering prayer and building trust among a community that is very suspicious of anyone from the outside.

Crisis Care has become a primary aspect of Faith and Works mercy ministry in the spirit of the Southeastern District's iNeighborhood. Our Director of Programs has received 525 applications for Crisis Care, connecting individuals through referrals to 40 different programs for support in the areas of food, housing, financial, legal assistance, addiction, physical and mental health, education, pregnancy, parenting and securing the proper identification.

In addition, we conducted a Back-to-School Back-pack drive in partnership with a few churches in the metro area and DTLR (Downtown Locker Room) where we provided just over 100 backpacks filled with school supplies to area students. DTLR provided a DJ, a tent and staff to assist as we enjoyed the music, shared a lunch of grilled hot dogs, chips and watermelon, and enjoyed uplifting camaraderie.

Once each month we partner with teams from three area churches who provide a hot meal outreach, serving approximately 150 each month. In Novem-

ber, we conducted a coat drive in partnership with the Emmanuel Cares Ministry of Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Catonsville, MD. The ministry provided 76 winter coats along with hats and gloves. In November 2018 after learning the space we were working to secure was no longer available, we partnered with Christ the King Episcopal Church near Security Square Mall who provided space to hold the classroom and candy-making elements of the Faith and Work program. Though the commute from Sandtown-Winchester included one stop by light rail and one bus route, we discovered through a small cohort of men that the distance and county location proved unsettling for our prospective participants and was therefore not a conducive learning environment for those we are seeking to serve.

We are close to securing a classroom space in Sandtown-Winchester and have partnered with Wockenfuss Candies on Harford Road in Northeast Baltimore to hold production one day per week on Saturday's.

Your grant has been a significant part of sustaining our uninterrupted presence in the community and the ability to provide Gospel outreach and mercy ministry through crisis services while working to secure a suitable location. We are thankful and grateful for your partnership in the work of serving the people of Sandtown-Winchester. Sincere regards,
