Good Day Beloved,

And the curtain of the temple was torn in two. ⁴⁶ Then Jesus, calling out with a loud voice, said, "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit!" And having said this he breathed his last. ⁴⁷ Now when the centurion saw what had taken place, he praised God, saying, "Certainly this man was innocent!"

In these verses from Luke, we see prophesy fulfilled. The curtain was torn in two and darkness encompassed the whole land. This is a sacrifice like no other man has made, nor father, for that matter. This was the biggest recorded act of love that mankind has been a part of. 


For me, it is helpful to start each day in thankfulness, listing what I am grateful for and also to keep a list of those who need prayers.





2022 Chesapeake District LWML Convention Information

This is the first time we will have a condensed convention. We will start registering at 2:00 pm on Friday, September 23, convention starts at 3:00 pm and will close at 4:00 pm on Saturday, September 24. One night in the Doubletree hotel will be \$125.35. We have a great line-up of speakers from organizations that have been funded by our mites. Erin and Jake Pomrenke will be our music leaders. Tune up your voices for lots of praising the Lord during our worship services. Each church can send two delegates. Delegates will select officers and mission grants, via Election Buddy prior to convention. There will be a delegate meeting via Zoom on September 10 to discuss proposed mission grants, nomination of officers and proposed By-Laws changes

Mighty Mites! Your Mites have made an impact! This grant is to provide education, mentoring and linkage to critical services for people in the Sandtown-Winchester neighborhood of West Baltimore. FAW was established in 2017 in partnership with Emmanuel Lutheran Church as an innovative nonprofit ministry around the mission of "Standing with local neighborhoods, building capacity for meaningful work and holistic wellbeing." Their threefold ministry incorporates a Gospel-centered approach focusing on 1) Community Stabilization, 2) Workforce Development and 3) Long-term Financial Literacy and Holistic Wellbeing. Community Stabilization helps people connect to supportive services for the essentials of daily living (ie: housing, food, transportation, drug treatment and mental health services) to create stability in preparation for employment.

Every penny counts. So keep those Mites coming. We are approaching the end of the biennium and have three more grants to fund totaling \$12,500. Please encourage your groups as well as your congregations to give toward these worthy grants. We are over 60% of the way there. Last November, the LWML from Prince of Peace in Virginia Beach baked 116 dozen cookies for a jail ministry. During their December Advent breakfast, the group packaged the cookies in small bags to send to the inmates of the Virginia Beach jail. The cookies were delivered and greatly appreciated. One inmate reported that upon receiving the cookies the entire mood changed, including that of the grumpiest inmate who sported a smile, and that cookies and coffee made for a party like atmosphere. This anecdote serves as a small testament to the impact of humble servitude and the importance of caring for the less fortunate.



Tidewater Zone met for their Winter Retreat at the Williamsburg Christian Retreat Center

Sixteen people stayed overnight, and we had five day -trippers who attended Saturday. Meals were provided by the center in the dining hall, and we had our own meeting room attached to the building with our rooms. Friday night we enjoyed a short devotion and our Pastoral Councilor, Pastor Graef, led us on the fiddle to sing "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." Kathryn Wacker taught us about Chrismons, where they originated and their different styles. Did you know Chrismons can be beaded wire, foam board, Styrofoam, crochet, cross stitch, beaded felt, embroidery, or paper? The ladies learned how to do a beginner bead and wire Fish Chrismon. Saturday Desiree Davis led a devotion called "Conversation Hearts from God" and Valentine's Day Trivia. We shared the love by exchanging "gifts" that we found around the room and wrapped. Music was led on the piano by Diane Bahr. Chaplain Ryan Rupe led a Bible Study on Psalms. After a business meeting and worship service we blessed our ingathering items: old towels, aluminum cans, Amazon gift cards, dogfood, leashes, collars, and dog toys given to support the Animal Aid Society in Hampton VA. A post dinner campfire with kettle corn was provided by Popcorn Bob from the WCRC who shared some of the history of the center. Just before bed we made one more Chrismon a bead and wire Latin Cross. Sunday morning, we made one more Chrismon. This one was slightly more difficult, a bead and wire star. What a wonderful weekend full of fellowship and worship and new and old friends. What a blessing to be able to meet at a retreat again!
