Oh, give thanks to the LORD, for He is good. And His mercy endures forever. Psalm 118:1

As we look to Thanksgiving Day coming later this month, we may be asked to think of our blessings—maybe even to count them and be mindful of them. Yes, Thanksgiving is a time that requires some reflection (even in the midst of stuffing ourselves with the stuffing from the turkey).

As we ponder our blessings from God, the explanation of the First Article of the Apostles' Creed helps us consider more fully all God so abundantly given to us:

I believe that God has made me and all creatures; that He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still takes care of them. He also gives me clothing and shoes, food and drink, house and home, wife and children, land, animals, and all I have. He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life. He defends me against all danger and guards and protects me from all evil. All this He does only out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me. For all this it is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him. This is most certainly true. See the importance of thanksgiving here: "For all of this it is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him." Yes, God certainly does give abundantly and He lovingly sustains us in our lives, and we can do no other to show our appreciation than to "thank and praise, serve and obey Him."



Martin Luther tells us from where thankfulness should come:

To begin with, we must rejoice at the less important good things which we enjoy according to the Second Table of the Law in that our bodies and possessions are protected. For these gifts are of minor importance when compared with those which we enjoy according to the First Table: that God has revealed Himself, has made known what He intends to do with us, gives us His Word, grants faith and the Holy Spirit, hears prayers, daily increases His church, etc. These things are so great that no tongue is able to amplify and praise them as they deserve.... To this David turns his eyes [in Psalm 122]; on this he meditates, and is so moved to gratitude.... For only those are truly thankful who receive the gifts of God joyfully and rejoice in the Giver.
